The University of Nottingham is a pioneering university providing an exceptional research-led education and an outstanding student experience. We deliver world-leading research that transforms lives and societies.

We're looking to the future

This is an important step in our university's history right now. We're an institution focused on making changes for the right reasons to make the University of Nottingham a university fit for the future.

We are prioritising our efforts and our resources to most effectively deliver on our core mission of teaching excellence, exceptional research and innovation, and an outstanding student experience.

Our focus is on being the best university we can be, conducting research that changes lives for the better and tackles some of the biggest challenges facing our planet today.

Our rich history

The University of Nottingham was founded on the vision and philanthropic spirit of Jesse Boot who, in 1928, donated the land that is now University Park. The vision of a university devoted to discovery, enterprise and the advancement of the human condition, combined with his lifelong commitment to improving health and wellbeing, remains intrinsic to the culture of the university today and will continue to underpin our future purpose.

Providing an exceptional research-led education and an outstanding experience for more than 45,000 students, from more than 150 countries. We rank 16th in the UK (THE World University Rankings 2024). We were recognised in the Research Excellence Framework 2021 as seventh for research power, and our graduates are among the most sought after in the UK (third for top employers, as rated by High Fliers Graduate Report 2024).

We have five faculties: Arts, Engineering, Medicine and Health Sciences, Science, and Social Sciences. In the last Research Excellence Framework, 90% of our research was classed as 'world-leading' or 'internationally excellent' (4* & 3*), with 51% of that assessed as 'world-leading' for its impact.

As a member of the UK's prestigious Russell Group and the Universitas 21 global network of research-intensive universities, the university delivers a high standard of education and is Gold-rated in the national Teaching Excellence Framework.

World-changing research

Changing the world will take collaboration, research, education and building our communities for the future.

Our pioneering researchers deliver solutions to complex global challenges. Our people work with communities, locally and globally, to make a difference.

We have a long history of delivering world-changing fundamental and translational research, taking findings and discoveries from the desk or laboratory and creating practical uses and products that improve people's lives.

We take sustainability seriously

We actively address the complex challenges facing our planet and are committed to making significant contributions to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

We're proud to be recognised among the world's top higher education institutions for our efforts, ranking in the Top 200 in the Times Higher Education Impact Rankings 2024.

Our world-leading research places us within the world's Top 100 for a number of individual SDG goals and our researchers deliver solutions to complex problems and work with partners in the UK and across the world so our innovations have transformative impacts on people's lives.

We've helped our partners cut CO2 emissions by 16.3m tonnes a year in recent years. Across transport, food, energy and other industries, our technologies are securing a net-zero future.

We are the birthplace of MRI

50 years ago, Professor Sir Peter Mansfield published the research paper that led to magnetic resonance imaging, an invention that transformed medicine. Today an MRI scan takes place every three seconds and countless patients have benefited from his invention.

Our legacy in the development of medical imaging includes the award of a Nobel prize in 2003 to Professor Sir Peter Mansfield. From humble origins in a physics lab in the late 1970s, it has become a world leading technology.

We are soon to host the UK's most powerful MRI scanner and our innovations in medical imaging continue to revolutionise understanding of brain function and human disease.

Setting Tourette's sufferers free

When Barbara Morera and fellow researchers from the schools of Psychology and Medicine first witnessed the reactions of participants in a clinical trial of a revolutionary treatment designed to ease the torment of people living with Tourette syndrome, she admits to being amazed – and moved.

The wearable device delivers rhythmic electrical pulses to the wearer's wrist, with the aim of reducing the verbal and physical tics associated with Tourette's. The device and its novel application of peripheral nerve stimulation also offers exciting possibilities for the treatment of a wide range of brain conditions.

The success of the trial, conducted with the support of the charity Tourette's Action and National Institute for Health Research Nottingham Biomedical Research Centre, attracted interest around the world and was the springboard for the creation of a University of Nottingham spinout company, Neurotherapeutics Ltd.

Securing net zero aviation

Climate change is the greatest challenge of our time and to safeguard the future of life on our planet, aviation must play its part in drastically reducing carbon emissions. The UK was the first major aviation sector in the world to commit to net zero CO2 by 2050, and underlined this pledge with interim decarbonisation targets of at least 15% by 2030 and 40% by 2040. Yet commercial aircraft in the sky are predicted to double in the next 20 years, with emissions soaring in their wake, and by 2050 10 billion passengers will fly every year.

To achieve such ambitious targets and deliver net zero aviation will take concerted and coordinated action, taking in clean aircraft technologies and propulsion systems, sustainable aviation fuels, advances in materials, manufacturing and aircraft maintenance and more efficient airspace and airport operations.

At the University of Nottingham, we have sector-leading strengths in these fields. With the support of our partners, our ambition is to make the East Midlands the world's foremost location for low-carbon aerospace innovation.

Slavery survivor voices shape anti-slavery action

The University of Nottingham's Rights Lab was created in response to UN Sustainable Development Goal 8.7 - to end slavery in every corner of the world by 2030.

The Rights Lab is supporting this mission through research that shapes national and international strategies for ending the enslavement of an estimated 40 million people globally.

It is the world's largest and leading group of modern slavery researchers, and Rights Lab scholars are fighting slavery from every angle: whether exposing it in developed countries through scrutiny of supply chains; mapping slavery from space in countries with fish farms, brick-making kilns or deforestation camps; or proposing new antislavery policies based on slavery survivors' own narratives.

Student experience

Our teaching is delivered by some of the brightest minds in their fields and shaped by the latest ground-breaking research.

Our graduates are not only talented but trailblazers in their fields, sought after by leading employers worldwide. It's why we are ranked the third most targeted university by top UK employers (High Fliers 2024).

A member of the prestigious Russell Group of world-class, research-intensive universities, we deliver teaching excellence and prepare our graduates for the world they will inherit and enable them to make an impact.

Management and governance

Council

The university's governing body is the Council, which approves the strategic plans of the university and is ultimately responsible for its finances, buildings and staff.

Sir Keith O'Nions took up the role of Chair of Council from 1 January 2020, having joined Council in November 2018. He is a renowned scientist and former President and Rector of Imperial College London. His career includes roles as Chief Scientific Advisor to the Ministry of Defence, Director-General Science and Innovation, Department for Innovation and Universities and Skills, and Chair of Cambridge Enterprise, University of Cambridge.

Council is made up of eleven lay members, two student members, and six academic members including the Vice-Chancellor and Deputy Vice-Chancellor.

Council currently meets in-person four times a year for sessions that last a day and a half. Council members engage with the university in between sessions, often through online meetings.

Senate

The academic authority of the University of Nottingham is the Senate, which has responsibility for directing and regulating teaching and examinations, and promoting research. The Senate is chaired by the Vice-Chancellor.

University Executive Board

The University Executive Board meets regularly and is chaired by the Vice-Chancellor. Its membership includes the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Pro-Vice-Chancellors, Chief Financial Officer, and others.

Person specification

Being a global university with influence and impact on an international knowledge economy depends on the passion and commitment of all its leaders, members and champions. University Council has a key role to play in the stewardship of the university, helping it to fulfil its mission and ensure ongoing integration with, and impact in, all the communities that the university is part of locally and globally.

We are now seeking to appoint exceptional lay members who will sit as members of University Council. Candidates will bring a breadth of experience at board level from the public, private or third sectors and will contribute their skills and insights to the effective stewardship and strategic directions of the university.

The role of a Council member is wide-ranging, contributing to the governance of the university, overseeing investment and financial matters and legislative responsibilities, promoting and making provision for research and the student experience, and generally exercising the powers of Council as set out in the university's ordinances.

Individually, as a Council member you will provide your advice, support and expertise to ensure that the university's activities and management are both effective and efficient, establishing constructive, supportive and appropriately challenging working relationships with senior staff across the institution. You will also ensure that our work is in accordance with the public interest governance principles set by the Office for Students as well as our university values of inclusivity, ambition, openness, fairness and respect.

Collectively, members of Council make certain that the university delivers its charitable objectives for the public benefit and manages public funds appropriately, protecting the interests of taxpayers and other stakeholders.

Council members should also make sure that all students have opportunities to engage with the university to allow the full range of perspectives to inform the management and governance of the university, and that academic staff have freedom within the law to question and test received wisdom and to put forward new ideas.

The following attributes are essential for Council members:

- A passion for, a personal interest in, and a commitment to higher education alongside a commitment to the values, aims and objectives of the university.
- High-level experience from the public or private sector as an executive or non-executive. This might
 include experience of large organisational change programmes.
- A willingness to support the senior management of the university as a critical friend, while promoting the interests, activities and strategic aims of the university in the wider community.
- Ability to devote sufficient time to Council on a voluntary basis, including attendance at four sessions a year, lasting a full day and a half each.
- Sound judgement and judiciousness.
- Skilled at leading and managing constructive debate.
- Diplomacy and sensitivity.

In accordance with the regulatory requirements of the Office for Students, every Council member must be a fit and proper person, and not have been responsible for or contributed to any serious misconduct or mismanagement.



Terms of appointment

Members of Council serve a four-year term and are then eligible for re-appointment for two further terms of two years each. The minimum time commitment for this will be approximately one day per month.

All positions are unremunerated, although reasonable expenses will be reimbursed.
